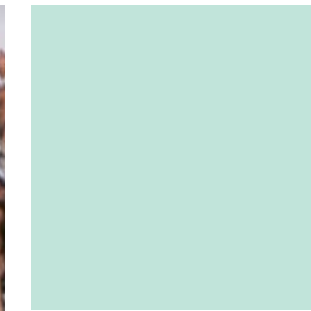
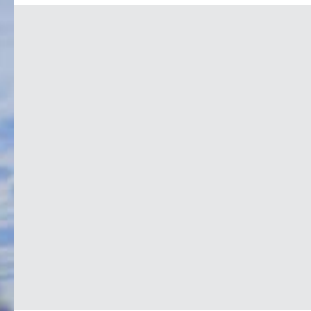
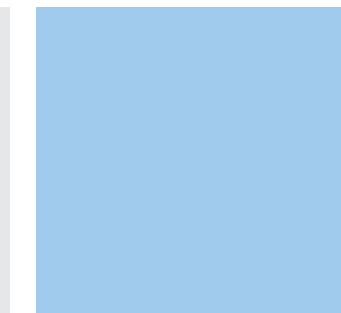
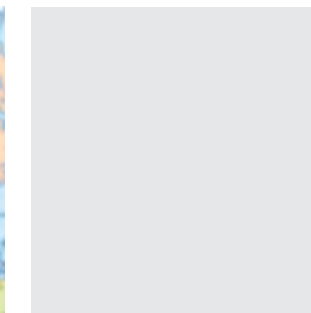
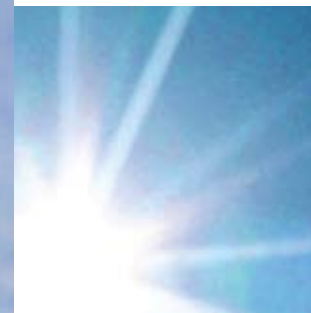


# A TOURISM DESTINATION

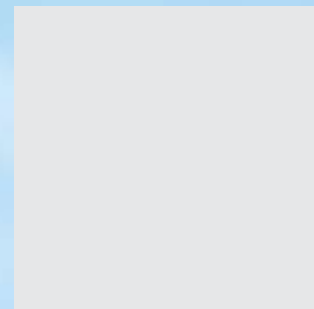

# WHAT PEOPLE ARE SAYING

Winnipeg has long been a multi-modal transport and logistics hub, with a cross section of industries that regularly utilize air cargo services. Currently, the city is a major distribution centre for western Canada and provides road and rail connections throughout North America. Direct links to ports on the Atlantic, Pacific, Great Lakes and Gulf of Mexico are provided by the four railways passing through Winnipeg.

Future enhancements include CentrePort Canada, a public-private initiative to build an inland port. Taking advantage of Winnipeg's central location and its well-established logistics sector, this project will create new manufacturing, warehousing and distribution infrastructure. It is expected to be designated Canada's first Foreign Trade Zone.

In 2008, cargo tonnage totaled 148,252 tonnes.
